SPEAKER/PRESENTER BIOGRAPHIES

Judith Adams-Volpe

is Director of Lockwood Memorial Library, University at Buffalo since 1989. She is a past-president of SUNYLA, and previously held library positions at Lehigh University, Library of Congress, Georgetown University, and Auburn University. She is author of The American Amusement Park Industry: A History of Technology and Thrills, and many other books and articles relating technology and society/culture. She holds an MLS from Syracuse University, and an MA in English from Lehigh University.

Nancy Cannon

is Reference/Instruction Librarian at the College at Oneonta. Previously, she served five years as a Reference/Instruction Librarian at Binghamton University. Nancy serves as Chair of the SUNYLA Library Instruction Committee. She has an MLS from the University at Albany, and a BS in Biology from the University of Wisconsin.

Laura Cohen

is Network Services Librarian at the University at Albany Libraries. In this capacity, she serves as Webmaster of the Libraries' Web site located at http://www.albany.edu/library. She has lectured and taught extensively about the Internet, and has published articles and essays on this topic. Her online tutorials about the Internet are widely used. Laura is Web Manager of the SUNYLA Web site, and is a member of the SUNYLA Executive Board.

Kathleen M. DeLaney

is a librarian in the University Archives at the University at Buffalo, where she is engaged in the processing of the Love Canal Collection for digitization. Currently, she is also a labor history field archivist for the Buffalo & Erie County Historical Society where she conducts collection and organizational surveys for the Harry Van Arsdale Labor History Documentation Project in cooperation with the NYS Department of Labor, New York University, and Cornell University. She has an MLS from the University at Buffalo, an MA in Anglo-Irish Studies from the National University of Ireland, and a BA in English from Canisius College.

Christopher Densmore

is University Archivist at the University at Buffalo. He is a former chair of both the Lake Ontario Archives Conference and the Description Section of the Society of American Archivists. He is currently chair of the Canadian Friends Historical Association. He is author of Red Jacket: Iroquois Diplomat and Orator (Syracuse U. Press, 1999), and of articles on archives and history published in New York History, Quaker History, and other journals. Chris holds an MA in History from the University of Wisconsin, and a BA in History from Oberlin College.

John Ellison

has been a professor in the School of Information Studies at the University at Buffalo for the past 28 years. He has been teaching Distance Learning courses for the past four years at both the University at Buffalo and the University of Illinois. He was the first professor at UB to teach an online Distance Learning course. Next January, he will be

a Fulbright Professor at the University of the West Indies where he will be working with faculty interested in Distance Learning, and he will also teach a Distance Learning course from the Caribbean for UB.

Peter Genovese

is Director of Libraries at Monroe Community College. He has served as a library director both in academic and public library settings. Peter is a frequent speaker at regional and international conferences, and he serves as a consultant in the areas of technology planning, library building program development, organizational change and innovation. His most recent assignments have been in Pakistan, Trinidad/Tobago, and the Ukraine. He holds an MLS from SUNY Geneseo, and a BA in Anthropology from the University at Buffalo.

Carol Anne Germain

is the Networked Resources Education Librarian at the University at Albany. Her current interests are in the development of remote access library instruction tutorials, although she continues to enjoy working with students at the reference desk and in the traditional classroom.

John Hammond

is the Executive Director of the North Country Reference and Research Resources Council. He is the former Chair of the Legislative Committee of the New York Library Association and a current member of the Regents Commission on Libraries.

Tim Hartnett

is Information Services Group Leader and Government Documents Librarian at Plattsburgh State University. He has taught library and information research skills for the last fifteen years. In addition to LIB 101, a required one-credit General Education course, he has taught course-related sessions and instructional technology workshops. For the past six years, he has team taught in a freshman learning community.

Carey Hatch

is currently the Assistant Provost overseeing the SUNY Office of Library and Information Services (OLIS) where he supports and coordinates a variety of cooperative library programs within the State University. OLIS is currently coordinating the SUNYConnect initiative that will create a seamless interface to the entire SUNY library collection, expand electronic resources for all libraries, and build shared storage facilities that can be used by all SUNY libraries. Prior to working for OLIS, Carey was the Senior Library Liaison Officer for SUNY/OCLC, responsible for providing technical support to libraries in the areas of microcomputer systems and software, and telecommunications technology. Carey holds an MLS from the University at Maryland, and a BA in Philosophy from the State University College at Brockport.

Janet Hogan

is Reference and Instruction Librarian in the Bartle Library at Binghamton University. She is a member of the Binghamton Libraries Instruction Working Group, and coordinates the training of the students who work at the Reference Desk as Library Peer Assistants. She is a member of the SUNYLA Library Instruction Committee.

Judith Hopkins

is Technical Services Research and Analysis Officer in Central Technical Services in the Libraries of the University at Buffalo, where she is presently involved with Metadata initiatives. She began her career as a cataloger at Mount Holyoke College, then the Yale Law Library, and then became one of the first library professionals (along with Fred Kilgour) on the staff of OCLC in the late sixties. She has been active throughout her career in ALA, presently serving as the Cataloging and Classification Section's representative to the ALCTS Committee on Electronic Communications, and as a member of the Committee on Cataloging, Description and Access Task Force on Metadata. She has recently been a presenter at an invitational seminar on Metadata sponsored by the National Autonomous University of Mexico in Mexico City.

Prior to NYLINK, Mary-Alice was the Director of Learning Resources at Adirondack Community College, Head of Technical Services/Systems at Schenectady County Community College, and held positions at Sweet Briar College, Schenectady County Public Library, Mohawk Valley Library Association, and the Brookline Public Library. She has had leadership roles in RONDAC, the Regional OCLC Network Directors Advisory Council, including the Task Force on Distance Learning, the Advisory Committee for the OCLC Institute, and the Executive Council. Mary-Alice has recently been elected Chair-Elect of RONDAC. She has also served as Chair of the SUNY Council of Library Directors. She earned her MLS from SUNY Albany, and a BA from Syracuse University.

Kate Majewski

is Reference, Instruction, and Cataloging Librarian at SUNY College of Technology at Delhi. She has worked in SUNY libraries in various roles since her sophomore year of college in 1989. She has worked with faculty on various projects involving the integration of technology into teaching and learning. is Reference Librarian/Bibliographer at Binghamton University's Bartle Library and is a member of the Libraries' Web team. He has an MLS from the University at Albany, and an MA in English from Binghamton University.

Eileen O'Hara

is Head of Circulation/Class Reserves at Drake Memorial Library, College at Brockport. As a member of the Library's Strategic Planning Committee, she presented the E-Reserves Project to the library administration. Eileen has been active in state and local library assistant

organizations. During 1992, she conducted numerous focus group sessions interviewing library assistants in the Rochester area for an ALA study on library support staff issues. She has served on the NYSLAA Executive Committee for three years and she received the NYSLAA Award for Outstanding Service in 1992. Previously she was Director of the US EPA Region 2 New York Library; Electronic Resources Librarian at Newark Public Library, Newark, NJ; Children's Librarian and Electronic Resources Librarian at Queens Public Library; and a Captain in the US Air Force. She is author of the popular column, "The Internet Librarian," appearing in American Libraries, and two books related to the Internet: A Practical Guide to Internet Filters (Neal Schuman, 1997), and The Internet Access Cookbook (Neal Schuman, 1996). She is a present member of ALA Council, and is a frequent speaker in the national context on intellectual freedom, Internet, and access issues.

Karen Senglaup

is Director of General Libraries Access Services at the University at Buffalo. She planned the transition to electronic access of reserve readings at UB, as well as the creation of the four new "Cybrary" computers for students areas in the Libraries. She is currently on a University committee reviewing campus policies on copyright and fair use.
