

NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT...

Well, it's hard to believe, but it is already 1994, and the Spring Semester is about to begin. The Fall Semester went by like a whirlwind for me, and it's equally hard to believe that my term as SUNYLA President is already half over! Before long, we will all be basking in the sun and the warm breezes by the lake at Oswego for the Annual Conference in June.

But, before the Spring Semester gains ground and goes whirling by, I wanted to take this opportunity to let you know about two important issues that the Executive Board and Council have been addressing. First, the Executive Board and Council have been grappling with possible revision to the SUNYLA Constitution and Bylaws. An Ad Hoc Committee, whose charge is to review the current Constitution and Bylaws and recommend possible revisions, was formed following the September 1993 Executive Board/Council Meeting. The Ad Hoc Committee is composed of the following members: Past President, Barbara Via (Chair); 1st Vice President, Chris Hebblethwaite; Membership Development Chair, Janet Steins; and Personnel Policies Chair, Ellie Gossen. The Committee has been painstakingly reconstructing all the changes that have taken place to the Constitution and Bylaws since the document was last printed and distributed to the membership -- my thanks to Janet Steins for her very hard work on that project. A revised copy of the Constitution and Bylaws will be distributed to each Delegate (who will in turn share it with the SUNYLA membership on their respective campuses) and will be posted on the SUNYLA Gopher (hopefully) in the spring. Discussion about the possible revision will continue throughout the remainder of this year, and into next year. Areas for possible revision include: audits of the treasurer's books; membership categories and dues structure; and duties of officers and committee chairs, among others. Any revisions, of course, will be voted on by the entire membership. Further information on this important topic will be reported on in future issues of the newsletter and SUNYLA-L.

Second, the Executive Board and Council have been working to establish official liaisons with two other SUNY-wide groups; FACT (Faculty Access to Computing Technology) and COA (Communication Officers Association). SUNYLA's liaison work with LAIP, LASG and the SUNY Council of Head Librarians have proven to be very beneficial, and it is hoped that cooperation with FACT and COA will prove to be equally beneficial. If you are interested in serving as a SUNYLA liaison to either FACT or COA, please contact me.

JOINT DATABASE GRANT

The SUNY Council of Library Directors has received an award of \$147,730 from SUNY Central to carry out the Joint Database Access Project, Toward a Collaborative Information Environment: A SUNY Libraries Pilot Project. The grant proposal, submitted by Barbara von Wahlde, Steve Roberts (University at Buffalo), Cerise Oberman (Plattsburgh), Eleanor Carter (Cobleskill), and Carey Hatch (SUNY Central) provides funds for eight SUNY Colleges to purchase TermPac and ProPac, NOTIS Z39.50 clients which will give them joint access to ERIC, a broad selection of Wilson databases, and the online catalogs of Buffalo, Stony Brook, and Binghamton. The project will run for 18 months. All databases will be mounted at the University of Buffalo. The libraries selected as TermPac sites are Broome Community College and SUNY Brockport. The ProPac sites are SUNY Cobleskill, SUNY Geneseo, Jamestown Community College, SUNY Oneonta, SUNY Oswego, and SUNY College of Technology at Utica/Rome. This grant will test the viability of SUNY-wide database sharing, including centralized purchase of online products and group access to both these products and to diverse online library catalogs.

CONFERENCE '94 -- OSWEGO

Long range forecasts are for great weather and an exciting conference at Oswego in June. Plans for the program are underway. Here are some of the expected highlights. As a keynote speaker we hope to present Langdon Winner, a political scientist at RPI who teaches about science and technology issues. He's also a columnist and author. Some of his recent writings include: "A New Social Contract for Science." Technology Review May-June 1993: 65; "Losing the Cooperative Edge." Technology Review Nov-Dec 1993: 68; "The Indifference of Technocrats." Technology Review Feb-Mar 1993: 65; "How Technology Reweaves the Fabric of Society." The Chronicle of Higher Education 4 Aug. 1993: B1+; "Citizen Virtues in a Technological Order," Inquiry, 35:3-4 (1992): 341; and "Artifact/Ideas and Political Culture." Whole Earth Review 73 (1991): 18. His books are The Whale and the Reactor (1988), Autonomous Technology: Technics-Out-of-Control as a Theme in Political Thought (1977), and, as

editor, Democracy in a Technological Society (1988).

At least one preconference session is planned for Wednesday afternoon, concerning MARC Archives & Manuscript Control format. The main conference should feature sessions on topics including the Internet, bibliographic instruction, document delivery, serials, personnel issues, government documents, OPACs, and more.

The conference brochure should appear in early spring. We hope to see many of you there.

NALA SCHOLARSHIP

KOSOVER COLLECTION OF JUDAICA

The University Libraries and the Judaic Studies Department of the University at Albany, State University of New York, are pleased to announce the publication of a new catalog entitled Kosover Collectin of Judaica, 1545-1850. Included in this 68 page guide are bibliographic entries, with subject and name indexes, for over 220 Hebrew and Judaeo-German works relating to Jewish life in Central Europe in the 17th and 18th centuries, with an emphasis on liturgical and halakhic practice. The collection includes several early works on Hebrew grammar, as well as legal responsa literature. Responsa literature provides a valuable resource for the study of Jewish social, political, economic, cultural and religious life in medieval and modern periods, and materials for the study of Jewish folklore. Many of these rare and unique titles, housed in the University Libraries' Department of Special Collections and Archives, were printed in Hebrew printing centers in Europe and constitute a valuable resource on the history of Hebrew printing and bookmaking.

The Kosover Collection of Judaica, 1545-1850 was prepared by Sharona R. Wachs, Monographic Cataloger, and includes an introduction by Dr. Judith R. Baskin, Chair of the Department of Judaic Studies at the University. Publication of the catalog was supported by the Kappa Beta Fraternity. Copies are available for \$7.50 (payable to the "University at Albany Foundation, Inc. - Library Development Fund") from Special Collections and Archives, University Libraries, University at Albany, State University of New York, 1400 Washington Ave., Albany, NY 12222.

Other

September 1993 marked the debut of HUBNET at the University at Buffalo Health Sciences Library. HUBNET (Hospitals and University at Buffalo Library Resource Network) is a collaborative project of the School of Medicine and Biomedical Sciences, the University Libraries' Health Sciences Library, and the libraries of seven Buffalo-area teaching hospitals. University at Buffalo faculty, students, and staff at these locations can search HUBNET from their institution's library or through remote access. HUBNET provides an array of information resources such as bibliographic databases, full text reference materials, the University Libraries' online catalog BISON, Internet access, and electronic mail. The bibliographic databases include MEDLINE, Cumulative Index to Nursing and Allied Health Literature, CancerLIT, Health Planning and Administration, and Current Contents. Full text materials include fifteen electronic journals, twenty-five clinical manuals, six textbooks, drug information resources, and expert systems used by clinicians as medical decision support tools.

HUBNET is a client server information system built upon a series of Novell servers and workstations located at the School of Medicine and Biomedical Sciences. The system has over twenty-five gigabytes of on-line reference materials and has twenty-one on-line CD-ROM drives. The system is constructed to handle as many concurrent users as most mainframe systems but at a fraction of the investment. Medical informatics, "the rapidly developing scientific field that deals with the storage, retrieval and optimal use of biomedical information, data, and knowledge for problem solving and decision making," is an initiative taking place at academic health sciences centers across the country including the University at Buffalo's community-based schools of the health sciences. HUBNET represents a significant step in this initiative with the development of the medical workstation supporting patient care, biomedical research, the training of health professionals, and the continuing education of clinicians.

Karen Ferington, Catalog and Archives Librarian, is working on a multi-year project to catalog the archives collection using the Innovative Interfaces Local Database software. The project began 3 years ago with sorting and organizing all of the records in the college archives. Next, an inventory of the records was completed using the New York State Archives Inventory Worksheet for Local Government Records. All records were then organized into twenty-six large record groups according to the college's organization chart. It was decided that the bibliographic records would be in standard MARC format. We worked with Innovative Interfaces to create a separate local database for the archives collection. Test records were loaded and any apparent problems were corrected. Then, original cataloging began for each of the twenty-six record groups. Corresponding authority records were created for each group to

provide cross-references. Original cataloging and data entry continues at present.

The NCCC Library was one of the first to use Innovative Interfaces software for cataloging an archives collection. When the record groups are all cataloged and in the local database, the information will be available on the OPAC for easier access to archival records relating to the history of NCCC.
