NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

The weather has been warm and spring-like for the past few days, but I know better than to get my hopes up in early March; we are bound to have more cold and snowy weather.

I'm also finding it hard to be too optimistic about our 1995/96 budget. As I write these words, we are approximately three weeks away from the deadline for a new budget. I'm hoping that SUNY will not receive the 31.5% cut in state support outlined in the Governor's proposal. In response to this proposal, the SUNYLA Council spent a portion of its March meeting revising a draft resolution. The resolution asked for a restoration of SUNY's 1995/96 state tax support to the 1994/95 level. I sent this resolution to Senator Bruno and Assemblyman Silver. At this time, it appears unlikely that SUNY will escape a decrease in state support; I can only hope that it will not be as devastating as 31.5%.

Distinguished Librarian Rank:

For those of you who have been following the proposal for a Distinguished Librarian Rank, I can share what I know at this time. In December, I was optimistic that we would have a Distinguished Librarian Rank by the end of January. The SUNY Board of Trustees was scheduled to make their final vote on the proposal at their January meeting. Unfortunately, this did not happen. According to the University Faculty Senate's President's Report, SUNY was unable to complete action on the Distinguished Librarian Rank proposal because of the moratorium placed on regulations by the Governor. James Chen, President of the University Faculty Senate, believes the proposal will be on the Board's agenda in a few months. Hopefully, we will have a Distinguished Librarian Rank by our annual meeting in June.

COA and FACT Liaisons:

I'd like to welcome two new members to our Executive Board. At our March meeting, the SUNYLA Council approved my appointment of Bill Drew (Systems Librarian at Morrisville) as our liaison with the Computing Officers Association (COA) and Gillian McCombs (Assistant Director of Technical Services at Albany) as our liaison with Faculty Access to Computing Technology (FACT). Both Bill and Gillian are enthusiastic about their appointments and I know they'll do a fine job facilitating communication between our organizations.

SUNY Council of Library Directors Task Forces:

In the January Newsletter, I mentioned that a subcommittee of the SUNY Council of Library Directors Executive Board was establishing several task forces to fulfill their recommendations in response to the Presidents' Commission Report on the Future of SUNY Libraries. The task forces have been established at this time and are as follows: Task Force on Wider Access to Information, Task Force to Develop the Information Skills of Faculty and Students, Task Force on Library Staff Support and Development, Task Force on Library and Other Campus Facilities, and Task Force to Develop New Financial Models. Membership on the task forces includes library representatives from each SUNY category, a representative from the Council of Library Directors, a representative from SUNYLA and representatives from a number of other organizations such as LASG, COA, TOA, FACT, etc. SUNYLA representatives on the task forces are Hal Kirkwood (Access), Marlene Hurley (Information Skills), Marilyn Kihl (Staff Development), Hilary Sternberg (Facilities), and Johanna Bowen (Finance). There are many SUNYLA members serving in other capacities on the task forces, so I am very pleased with the opportunity we have to contribute to the work of these groups. The task forces are expected to begin their work soon. You will hear about their progress via SUNYLA-L, the SUNYLA Gopher, the SUNYLA Newsletter, and your delegates.

Sabbatical Opportunity:

You may have seen a notice on SUNYLA-L about the Council of Library Directors' interest in finding someone to coordinate the work of the task forces mentioned on p. 1. One may do so by taking a sabbatical from his/her home campus or by some other means. The coordinator's duties may include, but not be limited to, the following:

1. Coordinating/facilitating communication among the chairs of the task forces;
2. Coordinating support services for the task forces with support from the SUNY Office of Library Services (OLS);
3. Coordinating data collection and analysis among the task forces to avoid duplication of requests for data from campuses, to create consolidated surveys, etc.;
4. Monitoring the resources needed by each task force and coordinating the request for these resources;
5. Reviewing all interim and final reports submitted by the task forces and compiling a final integrated report.

It is expected that the coordinator would work mostly from his/her home campus and have connection to e-mail services. Some time in Albany is inevitable. Clerical assistance, office space, equipment and supplies will be provided when working in Albany. OLS will also provide clerical assistance from a distance, e.g. by copying and distributing materials at the direction of the coordinator. There is a budget that will help pay for the coordinator's travel to Albany and to some of the task force meetings. The coordinator will work with a liaison from the Council (Eleanor Carter) and with an OLS liaison (Carey Hatch) as an Executive Management Team for the project. If you are interested in such a position please contact Eleanor Carter (cartere@snycobva) at Cobleskill as soon as possible.

Last, but not least, I'd like to continue to encourage members to get involved in SUNYLA. We have a strong tradition of helping to further the educational mission of SUNY by improving our library services and library personnel. I think that the Presidents' Commission Report on the Future of SUNY Libraries and the recommendations for implementing this report from the SUNY Council of Library Directors give us clear advice about what needs to be done to keep SUNY libraries strong. I know that our committee chairs would welcome your participation. Please look over the list of our standing committees printed in the front of your SUNYLA Directory and contact the chair of the committee you are interested in working on.

SUNY LIBRARIANS ASSOCIATION
RESOLUTION REGARDING THE
PROPOSED 1995/96 SUNY BUDGET
MARCH 3, 1995

- Whereas, The Governor's budget proposal calls for a reduction in state support of SUNY from \$918 million in 1994/95 to \$629 million in 1995/96, a cut of \$289 million or -31.5%;
- Whereas, An overwhelming portion of this decrease in state assistance is expected to be replaced by generating additional revenues of \$215 million by drastically increasing SUNY tuition, possibly as much as \$2,300;
- Whereas, A substantial increase in SUNY's tuition coupled with an expected reduction of TAP (Tuition Assistance Program) and the proposed elimination of EOP (Educational Opportunity Program) will make SUNY institutions less accessible to low-income students;
- Whereas, Decreased enrollment at SUNY institutions will not only decrease the diversity of their student populations, but will also decrease revenues for their campuses and campus communities;
- Whereas, Decreased tuition revenues along with the proposed \$73.5 million reduction in program expenditures will cripple the ability of some institutions to provide viable academic programs and may necessitate the closing of some institutions;

- Whereas, It is imperative for the successful preparation of competitive SUNY graduates that students and faculty use and continue to learn about new information resources and electronic networks which require added technical support and training;
- Whereas, The quantity and cost of printed and electronic information are growing faster than our budgets have been able to accommodate, and the need for new technologies that allow the sharing of resources through rapid delivery of all types of information to faculty and students is immediate;
- Whereas, Many campuses within SUNY have aging campus facilities, including libraries, that do not have connections to campus computer networks and to the Internet, essential ingredients for a competitive and successful academic environment;
- Whereas, Large portions of SUNY library collections are deteriorating due to poor quality mediums and inadequate environmental conditions, and state funds for appropriate storage facilities are essential for the preservation of older, historically significant materials;
- Whereas, SUNY libraries provide library instruction, service, and materials to high school students and budgetary restrictions may require elimination of this important college preparatory experience;
- Whereas, For people in many rural New York communities, a SUNY institution is their only access to a large library with research and other information resources, the loss of which will significantly affect the educational and vocational opportunities of many citizens;
- Whereas, SUNY libraries provide invaluable service and resources to local businesses; and
- Whereas, Substantive, sufficient, and consistent financial support for SUNY is needed to recover from the fiscal hardships of the past five years and to maintain high quality research and services which are fundamental to the state's economic, medical, educational, environmental and social well-being and which give SUNY its competitive stance among other public institutions of higher education; therefore, be it
- Resolved: That the SUNY Librarians Association Executive Board and Council urge their state leaders to restore SUNY's 1995/96 state tax support to the 1994/95 level just as is proposed for K-12 districts and municipalities.

SUNYLA '95 IN PLATTSBURGH

The program for the 27th Annual SUNYLA Conference, to be held June 7-9, 1995 at SUNY Plattsburgh, is complete. Conference brochures and registration forms will be distributed to all SUNY members. There will be two preconferences on Wednesday, June 7. One will be a workshop led by Diane Hillman (Head of Technical Services, Cornell University Law Library), on Cataloging Electronic Resources; the other, organized by Carey Hatch and LAIP, will be a demonstration of new technologies available to create an electronic library.

Thursday, June 8, will feature a keynote address by Dr. James W. Hall, SUNY Vice Chancellor for Educational Technology. Dr. Hall will speak on "The SUNY Technology Initiative: Proposals and Prospects." Thursday's activities will also include sessions on the following topics: Bibliographic Instruction in a Distance Learning Program; Internet Resources on Campus; Collection Development and Multicultural Diversity; Cooperative Collection Development and Resource Sharing within SUNY; and Internet User Instruction. There will also be poster sessions, vendor exhibits, demos of distance learning technology, and (last but definitely not least) recreation and entertainment organized by the Local Arrangements Committee.

On Friday, June 9, session topics will include: End-user CD-ROM Searching; Managing Authority Control in an On-line Environment; Use of the Internet for Reference; Evaluating Internet Information; and Electronic Reserves. The sessions will be followed by the SUNYLA annual meeting. This year's Conference promises to be a stimulating exploration of current issues affecting SUNY librarians. We hope to see you there.

SUNYLA GOPHER AT PLATTSBURGH*

Directions to Access Gopher

Most SUNY campuses have some form of access to the Internet through SUNYNET or NYSERNET. Check with your campus computer center for information on computer accounts and to find out if a Gopher client is running on your campus computer. Two sets of instructions follow: the first for users without Gopher clients and the second for users with Gopher clients running on campus computers.

1) Campuses Without a Gopher Client:

If your campus computer has access to the Internet but does not yet offer a Gopher client, you can log on to your campus computer and "telnet" (remote logon) to a computer that has a "public" Gopher client running, i.e., one that you can use without a special userid/password.
